
Police Officer?

Mandie must choose someone she respects and trusts who will be able to help her.




Mandie's school teacher, mother or a Police Officer would be the best people to help her report a crime.

There were **two** boys involved in vandalising the bus.






ANSWIII. It was day-time.

The bus was outside the school.



Mandie saw what happened to the bus. Can you recall what happened?

ANSWIR:


Mandie saw one boy throw a rock at the bus and smash a window while another watched.

This is called vandalism. Vandalising is a crime.



What do you think happened after the boys broke the bus window?

These are called consequences.



ANSWER:

Because the bus was vandalised the class felt very sad and disappointed that they could not go to the sports carnival. It was wrong for the two boys to vandalise the bus.



The consequence was that the whole class missed playing sports because of what the two boys did.
