What is a local Neighbourhood Watch Program?



A local Neighbourhood Watch Program is a community led safety and awareness program that aims to prevent crime, stop social isolation and increase the safety, security and quality of life for everyone in the community. A Neighbourhood Watch Program gives people cause and confidence to make contact with and simply talk to, their neighbours. A Neighbourhood Watch Program helps people feel more connected to each other in their community. Community participation and a shared responsibility for what is happening in the local neighbourhood can be vital to feelings of safety. By communicating with neighbours, neighbours can share important information that will help make the community a safer place. Neighbours are in the best position to notice when something unusual is happening in an area and are able report any suspicious activity to police.

Cyber Safety - ThinkUKnow

Many Australians,
particularly those most
vulnerable, express a lack
of understanding about
technology and how they
can protect their families
from the risks of its use.
There is increasing concern
from the community about



the use of technology as a crime enabler. This can lead to fear of crime in the community, and ultimately create inhibitive behaviours and have a negative effect on the economy if not addressed. If members of the community do not believe that police are being successful in addressing such crime, they will be less likely to supply information, and with less intelligence from the community, investigations may stall.

NHWA Diagrammatic Safety Brochures

NHWA has produced diagrammatic brochures that are specifically designed for culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) community members. Through visual learning the basic ideals and values of Neighbourhood Watch are portrayed to



ensure that the Australian principles of keeping yourself, your family and your belongings safe are shared with people newly arrived in Australia. Through a series of diagrammatic illustrations, each brochures depicts examples of correct behaviours/decisions required for keeping themselves and their property safe. The series of brochures also list interpretation service contact details, along with the emergency and non urgent police assistance telephone numbers.

The 'You Decide' series of educational books have been produced by NHWA as part of the ongoing resources and educational programs targeted specifically for the needs of indigenous Australian communities, to help address community safety and crime prevention issues.







Clean and Clear Project, Tiwi Island (NT)




